

**7 Generations Early Childhood Intervention
FY 22 Quarter 1 Summary**

Activities	Brief Program Updates
Coordination and collaboration between Lewis and Clark County Criminal Justice Service Department, Lewis and Clark Public Health and Lewis and Clark Detention Center	FY 22 brings the third fiscal year to the program. LCPH had hoped that since COVID cases were declining in the Spring of 21, in-person visits would become more of the norm. However in the Summer of 21, COVID cases began to rise again. LCPH Home Visitor has still been able to visit the LCDC but remains cautious.
Identifying Target Populations	CONNECT referrals continue to increase: Quarter 1 FY 22 referrals: July: 5 August: 2 September: 6
Establishing and Providing Services	COVID continues to significantly affect the progression of the 7Generations Program. However, referrals are increasing and the overall number of enrolled clients has increased to 37 affecting 49 families.
Comprehensive Data Sets	Created spreadsheets to capture required data sets. See below for Quarter 4 Data Sets.
Long Range Plans and Transferability	LCPH staff attend and participate in the Early Childhood Coalition Leadership Team of the Greater Helena Area. LCPH Home Visiting Program Supervisor chairs and is working to restructure the Home Visiting Task Force. LCPH Home Visiting will continue to provide services via virtual platform as recommended by the CDC and Lewis and Clark Public Health. Looking forward to working with an intern from the University of Utah that is living in Helena to assist in developing a plan to track the children served over time.
Program Challenges	Now that the pandemic has lessened, the 7Gen program can begin again to work to increase referrals. The challenge for the next fiscal year will be to determine how we can monitor the children served over 18 years.

Explanation of Services Provided:

TREATMENT PLANNING: Determine what referrals meet treatment needs: Counseling / Chemical dependency, outpatient to inpatient options / Family Treatment Court / Medical home / Psychiatric medication / Peer support / AA - NA / Etc.

STABILIZATION: Moving from incarceration to stability: Readiness to engage with family and children / Housing: sober living home , public options / Employment / Outstanding legal issues needing attention / Drivers license, Transportation, / Financial issues.

FAMILY SUPPORT AND EDUCATION: COS / COS classes / Support Group/ Hi set - College - work skills. / Problem Solving Skills / Team building such as CPS - grandparents - professionals to support and guide as wrap around support.
