



LCC 4-H Member Spotlight - Ashton McGaugh

Ashton McGaugh, a member of the Wild Roses 4-H Club, was recently elected as President of the County 4-H Youth Council for 2020-2021. This year is only Ashton's third official year in 4-H. However, he has already shown himself to be a valuable member of the Lewis and Clark County 4-H community.

Ashton moved to Montana with his family in 2016, coming here from Clinton, Mississippi. During Ashton's first year

in 4-H, he was a member of the Canyon Creek Stock 4-H Club and served as a club Vice

President. His projects were Poultry, Shotgun and Goat. At the 2019 Fair he won Grand Champion for his Poultry Meat Pen. Ashton joined Wild Roses 4-H Club and began his second year in 4-H. He was elected to be the Wild Roses club President. During that year he also expanded his projects to include Beef, Dairy Cattle, and Wood Working along with Shotgun and Poultry. He was awarded top ribbons in Dairy Cattle and Woodworking at the 2020 4-H Fair. He successfully marketed his 1475-pound Red Angus steer and also earned the Senior High Point award in Dairy Cattle. And he again won Grand Champion for his Poultry Meat Pen.

During the 2020 Fair Ashton was selected to be interviewed on television news for media coverage about the 2020 Livestock Sale. The MTN News interview aired the night of the Livestock Sale and showed locally on KXLH During the interview Ashton talked about the differences in this Livestock Sale done in the open air compared to his previous year when the sale was conducted inside the Fairgrounds Multipurpose Building (barn). Ashton clearly showed his enthusiasm for the event and reaching a personal goal of successfully marketing his steer, "Whiskey," that he had been caring for just over a year.

At the Wild Roses 4-H November club meeting last month, Ashton was re-elected to serve another year as club President. Another role that he is now filling for a second year in a row is that of serving as a Poultry Project Junior Superintendent.

The Poultry Project Superintendent, Lexie Edwards, says about Ashton: "As a second-year project member in Poultry (during the 2019-2020 4-H year), Ashton jumped in as a project junior superintendent greatly improving the overall function of the Poultry project and the experience for both project members and leaders alike." Notably, Ashton led Poultry Project training where members learned about using a brooder box and important tips about caring for baby chicks. He also participated in providing two virtual online Poultry workshops to keep the project going when Poultry could not meet in-person during this past April and May.

Outside of 4-H, Ashton's interests have included baseball, soccer, cross country and track. More recently he was often enjoying the exercise of ice skating. Ashton is a high school senior this year and is interested in attending college but has no definite plans as of yet. Some of the goals he has expressed to his family have included the possibility of becoming a pastor or youth minister.

Whatever he does in the future – and I expect he will be successful – I am glad to have him around again this 4-H year. As his club leader, and as the assistant Superintendent of Poultry, I see a 4-Her who is helpful, friendly, dependable and loyal. He can be relied on to provide knowledgeable leadership and support at club and project meetings. Thank you for all you do, Ashton McGaugh.



Sewing, quilting, knitting, crochet, weaving, and embroidery are projects that take time to complete. We will be having workshops that start in October and go through to April.

They will be held at Capital Baptist Fellowship, 1727 Waukesha, at the corner of Laurel and Waukesha. The dates for the workshops are December 13, January 10, February 7, March 14, and April 11. We will have Sewing Revue on April 25.

The workshops will take place from 2:00-4:00 p.m.

Make sure that you bring a mask with you. I will also have hand sanitizer and cleaning supplies.

Sewing students - please come prepared: Prewash your fabrics before cutting out pattern If comfortable, cut the patterns prior to the workshop as there is limited space Know your sewing machine - how to thread and rewind a bobbin, using the foot pedal Minimum sewing supplies to have handy are: T Scissors - preferably shears T Dressmaker pins or quilting pins T Pin cushion T Seam ripper T 6" ruler T Seam gauge T Measuring tape T Marking pencil/pen T Sewing machine (if you don't have one, we have one or two machines to share)

Knitting, crochet, embroidery and weaving this is also a time for these projects.

Knitting - bring your own needles and yarn; crochet - crochet hook and yarn; embroidery - embroidery thread, hoop and material; weaving - yarn or thread for your project.

Lewis and Clark Archers

There are several events that your archers can participate in this winter. Lewis and Clark archers has an event on Dec 4th in Helena and it will utilize USA Archery vertical or single spot targets as a warmup to the Montana State USA Archery JOAD Indoor Nationals on Jan 1, then Montana State USA Archery Indoor Nationals on Jan 2 (Jan 3rd is set as an overflow day if we need more time for shooters). Both of these events will rank you in the state and in the Nationals. You can shoot once for a state title and the same score counts towards a national title. These events have not been held in Montana in a lot of years and it is an opportunity to do so in Townsend. Kids under 12 on the first day of event shoot at 9meters all others are at 18meters.

The L&C Warmup will be held in Helena at their indoor range and is a great introduction to USA Archery format and rules for \$10. Here's the link to the Indoor Nationals Warmup. https://bowscore.com/tournaments/lewis-clark-usa-archery-warm-up#/

Entry fees are \$20 for State JOAD and \$20 for USA Archery JOAD Nationals. Entry fees for Indoor Nationals is \$40 for State and \$40 for USA Archery Indoor Nationals and is not limited to kids. You must enter the State Tournament to have your scores counted for either JOAD or Indoor Nationals at the national level. I understand this is a lot of info to process. Please feel free to call, text or email any questions and I will help walk you through it. If I don't answer, leave a message or text and I will call you back ASAP.

NFAA Indoor Nationals

All, Lewis and Clark Archers just got permission to host NFAA Indoor Nationals at their range in Helena on December 5th and 6th. It will be on the Blue 5 spot target or the blue single spot and is 12 ends of 5 arrows with two practice ends. NFAA is almost always 2 days and this one is no different. There is only one-line time per day, Saturday will be at 3pm and Sunday will be at 9 am. This event is limited to 32 archers including adults and youth, so it will sell out and it pays to register early. Youth entry fee for this event is \$50 if registered before November 23rd. Youth 11 and under on December 5th shoot at 10 yards. all others shoot at 20 yards.

We will have weekly Tuesday evening workshops in which project members learn how to cast a fishing rod, learn how to tie fishing knots, learn how to do rod & reel maintenance, learn about Montana Fishing Regulations, and much more. This Project moves to outdoor fishing as the season progresses giving project members an introduction to stream, river, pond and lake fishing at numerous locations throughout the Helena area.

The Sport Fishing project of 4-H is about learning and enjoying the treasure we call the Montana outdoors. There is a fee to participate in this project; however, project books are not required. Instead, members do 4-H Record Book pages where they can keep any handouts received and make note of what they learn at each workshop. FISHING TIP / SAFETY TIP: BE CAREFUL WITH YOUR FISHING LINE. Dispose of it properly. Fishing line left in the water or laying around on land is not safe for fish and animals.

What is the safety issue about fishing line? One example of what can happen was

published in several Montana newspapers including the Billings Gazette on June 19th, 2016. Helena reporter Tom Kuglin wrote about two geese that had become entangled in fishing line at Spring Meadow Lake in Helena. Note the photo here showing fishing line wrapped around a bird's legs and feet.

The article stated, "They [the two geese] would've lost their feet where the monofilament had dug in, but their feet are going to be OK and we're hoping to get them released..." according to Lisa Rhodin, then manager of Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks wildlife rehab center. The article went on to state that "the wildlife center gets several calls each year of birds tangled in fishing line. FWP encourages anglers to dispose of line in designated PVC pipes located at some fishing access sites or to simply place it in a pocket and throw it away." Lisa Rhodin also said, "It is a widespread problem wherever there happens to be fishing. That's the main message is be responsible for what you put out there."

Saturday, December 12th, 2020, at 1:00 pm in the Bill Hamilton 4-H Building BHB. We use the 4-H project books and will have some available for purchase. Returning project members - bring your project book - but No birds for this meeting.

Our November workshop was inperson on Saturday, Nov., 14th in the BHB. Level one project members did pages 22 & 23 of Poultry Project Book level one ("Scratching the Surface") that had project members working on "Talk the Talk." This section practices the typical language of 'poultry land." Activities were matching words with definitions and using a Poultry Word Bank to

Poultry Winterization

Plug drafts, vent area; thickly insulate floor (straw, sawdust, shavings)

Provide roosting space – have area where poultry can get out of snow

Heated water bowl or heated bird bath if water dishes might freeze

Gradually increase feeding, providing slow digesting foods

Birds need activity – maybe hang a cabbage or lettuce head to peck

identify terms in the Poultry Word Find on page 23.

The level 2 activity for this meeting was to do "Sick Chicks" on pages 30 & 31 of the 4-H Poultry Project Book level two ("Testing Your Wings"). The level two members created a list of 6 major diseases of poultry, including the type of bird affected, the likely cause of each illness, symptoms and treatment, as well as prevention methods. General discussion at the workshop addressed bird illnesses that members have dealt with and also how to keep poultry healthy throughout the winter months. A hand out was provided about winterization. Key points are listed in the chart included with this article. However, the most important thing to do to care for poultry during the winter is to watch them carefully for signs of illness or discomfort. Some winter days are worse than others, and adjusting your care to meet the birds' needs is the best way to keep them happy and healthy all winter long.

Project members of both levels are encouraged to review the list of species and breeds on page 8 of the Level One project book along with the parts of a bird on page 6. Knowing this information will help them to identity the parts of poultry, an important skill for this project and judging at Fair.

Near the end of the November workshop, all project members worked on their Record Book pages, noting down something they learned at the workshop. Those members who had not been present in October also wrote down their 3 project goals for Poultry this 4-H year.

If you are interested in the Swine Project, don't hesitate to reach out to me to ask any questions you might have before jumping in. It is truly rewarding and exciting.

It's time to start looking for breeders. Some things to think about. Pigs should weigh around 230-280 lbs at fair. Anything above 300 is considered heavyweight. That doesn't mean they are not great animals but that isn't the normal 'market weight.' Pigs will gain 1.5 to 2 lbs per day (based on a 3 to 1 feed to gain average) so be mindful of when your pig is born, how much you plan to feed it, what you plan to feed it, and how many days you'll feed it through weigh in day at fair.

Many breeders plan for 4-H pigs so check with them early to see if they are having success with breeding and farrowing on a timeline you expect. FUN FACT: Swine gestation period is 3 months, 3 Weeks, 3 days (114 days +/- 2 days). So, if you want pig at the right weight, Mama pig is already doing her job.
